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
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## Une entreprise norvégienne recevra livraison de cinq vraquiers à superstructure rangée en cale

Une telle mesure s'impose car les

vraquiers devront passer par la rivière Sava et le Danube pour se rendre en mer Noire. Ce parcours, qui implique le passage sous de nombreux ponts, pose problème car beaucoup de ces ouvrages sont trop bas pour la superstructure des navires.

L'armement des navires, c'est-à-dire l'installation de tous les moyens nécessaires à sa navigation, s'effectue à Sava en Yougoslavie, où les superstructures sont assemblées de façon temporaire avant d'être démontées et rangées en cale. Les vraquiers sont ensuite dirigés vers le

chantier de Kladovo à cent-soixantedix kilomètres à l'est de Belgrade. À cet endroit, la superstructure est retirée de la cale et assemblée de façon permanente à la coque du vraquier.

Le premier de ces navires, le Sava Lake, d'une largeur de 12,70 mètres, a déjà subi cet étrange rituel avec succès. Les constructeurs et navigateurs chargés de mener les bateaux à bon port ne doutent pas que les quatre autres vraquiers verront leur voyage inaugural couronné de la même réussite.

# Yellow accroît son réseau au Canada

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
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#### Saint John, New Brunswick: "The greatest little city in the East"



Marquet Square

The 76,381 residents of Saint John have a lot to boast about. In recent years there have been major development and restoration projects in the heart of Canada's oldest incorporated city that have resulted in a delightful blending of the past and present. Market Square is an excellent example with its facade of 19th century buildings and interior of trendy boutiques, restaurants, and night spots overlooking Market Slip.

It was here that thousands of United Empire Loyalists landed in 1783. Today the year round, capacious harbour welcomes pleasure boats from the eastern seabord and ships from around the world.

During the late 1800's thousands of Irish immigrants arrived at the port. Many were kept quarantined on Partridge Island which has been referred to as the Ellis Island of Canada. Due to the historical significance of the island it has been designated as a National Historic Site twice and a museum is now open on the island.

The city claims many first including the first police force in North America, the first newspaper and bank in Canada as well as being the site for the conception of many important inventions.


Four walking tours - Prince William's Walk, A Victorian Stroll,

the Loyalist Trail, and the Douglas Avenue Amble make exploration of the city's historic streets easy. Each tour takes approximately 1 1/2 hours and brochures are available at the municipal tourist information centers located throughout the city. Guided historic walking tours are available daily in July and August leaving from Barbour's General Store, Market Slip.

Historical attractions these fascinating walks include Barbour's General Store, restored and stocked to the years 1840-1940 and complete with a vintage barbershop; Loyalist House, a Georgian mansion built in 1816 that pays tribute to the Loyalists; restored Pleasant Villa School; the old Loyalist Burial Grounds; Chubb's Corner; a Jewish Historical Mu-Trinity Church; the Church of St. Andrew and St. David, and many homes and buildings that are worthy examples of their own particular period of architecture.

Prince William Street with its unique craft stores, antique shops and galleries is of particular interest to collectors. The street is one of the few in Canada to be named, "National Historic Streetscape".

Saint John is also the home of the New Brunswick Museum, Canada's first museum, founded in 1842 by distinguished scientist Dr. Abraham Gesner. The museum features national and international art treasures and historic artifacts, a natural science gallery, works by Maritime artists, provincial

and Canadian memorabilia, with a bookstore and a tea-room.

Other important historical attractions are Carleton Martello Tower, a stone fortification surviving from the War of 1812 and now a National Historic Site; Telephone Pioneers Museum, and Fort Howe Blockhouse, a replica of a 1777 blockhouse. Visitors are afforded a panoramic view of the city from the fort.

On Hazel Avenue, the Aitken Bicentennial Exhibition Center has five galleries featuring local and travelling exhibitions of art, crafts, photography, science, and technology collections.

Not to be missed is the Old City Market - Canada's oldest. Some of the same families have operated stalls for generations. An eye-opening variety of fresh seafood, fruits, vegetables, crafts, antiques, and collectibles are for sale. Reflecting the importance of shipbuilding to the city, the interior of the market was modelled, after the inverted hull of a ship, the market is open every day except Sundays and holidays.

A unique phenomenon takes place twice each day in Saint John. The tides of the Bay of Fundy reach such heights that they actually force the Saint John River to flow upriver, creating the Reversing Falls Rapids. There are two lookouts that provide good viewing points.


Rockwood Park in the heart of the city features camping, swimming, a waterslide, bumper boats, miniature golf, an 18 hole golf course and an aquatic golf driving range.

In the Cherry Brook Zoo many animals on the endangered species list wander and graze in a pleasant woodland setting.

Saint John has several world class sport complexes. The Aquatic Center located adjacent to Market Square welcomes visitors to enjoy its superb facilities for a modest fee.







The Port of Saint John is unique among the major ports of Eastern North America. With a dynamic complex of modern terminals, facilities, services, and equipment, Saint John can accommodate any shippers requirements. Petroleum, pulp and paper products, lumber, steel, auto parts, roll-on/roll-off traffic, and specialty cargoes are all easily handled through the Port's twenty-four berthing facilities and private terminals. The Port of Saint John has a total docking frontage of 4,800 meters, shed storage areas of 105,500 square meters, and 47 hectares of open area.

Construction began in June to build a third forest products shed which will add 100,000 sq. ft. of transit shed space for forest products. The extra 100,000 sq. ft. of space will

build on Saint John's position as a major load center for forest products in Canada.

Considerable capital investment in the past decade has resulted in a modern, efficient port. The most recent development is the Barrack Point Potash Terminal. Two sheds, one of 75,000 tonnes capacity belonging to the Potash Company of America, a second of 115,000 tonnes belonging to Denison-Potacan Mines, share a loading facility at a Courtenay Bay berth owned by the Saint John Corporation. Throughputat the Barrack Point Terminal is in excess of 1.5 million tonnes annually.

Long Wharf Termanil on the east side of the harbour has a 26,000 tonnes capacity salt shed. Approximately 180,000 tonnes of salt is exported an-


nually, it is used as road salt in the eastern US.


The Lantic Suger Refinery has a berth on the main harbour and imports raw sugar. Approximately 250,000 tonnes of raw sugar is refined in Saint John. The Atlantic Provinces and Quebec are served from this refinery which celebrated its 75th anniversary in 1990.

The Port of Saint John handled approximately 15 million tonnes of cargo in 1990, an estimated 2 million metric tonnes was dry bulk commodities.

The Port of Saint John offers remarkable diversity to shippers and shipping lines. With its variety of modern, efficient terminals, its services, and its geographic location, the Port of Saint John is a superb choice for both exporters and importers.

#### Forest Products Terminal

Forterm, which operates the Navy Island Forest Products Terminal just across the water from the Hilton, is at the heart of the day's tour. It is organizing a wide range of active operations which will be ongoing throughout the day involving its custom-designed equipment for handling forest products.

These will include receiving of newsprint, corrugating medium and woodpulp from both truck and rail, and also some unitizing of loose woodpulp on Forterm's on-site unitizing machines. There is also a very good chance that some vessels will be loading, though of course this cannot be guaranteed.

The terminal has a quarter ramp and two stern ramps for RoRo operations and on-site rail service. It also has a full container service. Its 32,500 m<sup>2</sup> of modern transit area is now joined by a new 10,000 m<sup>2</sup> warehouse.

#### Display of equipment for handling forest products


A display of the latest equipment used in the handling of forest products is being prepared. The following companies are planning to take part: Hyster Canada; Caterpillar; Cascades Hydraulics; Auramo (showing its new 'intelligent'clamp); Ottawa Trucks, as well as several other trailer manufacturers.

#### Saint John Shipbuilding

A tour of Saint John Shipbuilding Ltd will be a real treat. This is the largest shipbuilding facility in Canada and is the choice of the Canadian Navy for construction of its newest vessels. The company is in the midst of a C\$4,000-million contract for the construction of 12 frigates, and delegates will be offered a first hand view of the many state-of-the-art techniques.

#### Corrugated box plant

Corrugated boxes: not only do many delegates ship the raw materials but also the final product. One of the commonest forms of packaging, corrugated boxes are produced by Maritime Paper Products Ltd in Saint John. It is intended that delegates will view the entire process from receiving the rolls of corrugating medium and linerboard through to production of the box itself.



#### Irving Paper Ltd.

The Irving Paper Mill, though only some 20 years old, has recently undergone a massive capital improvement program, including the addition of an integrated CTMP (chemi-thermomechanical pulp) process. Delegates will be given the opportunity to view the operation from the wood handling process through to the warehouse, where finished product is loaded for inland transport to the port.

#### The best of Canadian beer



# St. Anne-Nackawic Pulp Company Ltd.

In the early 1960's, the Government of New Brunswick began construction of a hydro-electric dam at Mactaquac to produce additional electrical power for the needs of the province. The dam raised the water level on the St. John River from Mactaquac to Woodstock, this resulted in many farms and small settlements being flooded and their residents moving their homes to higher ground along the river valley. The rising water behind the dam formed a natural lake where the Nackawic River joins the St. John River, it was at this junction that Nackawic, New Brunswick's first model industrial community was built.

The village of Nackawic was originally planned to accommodate some of the families forced to relocate because of the Mactaquac dam project. However, local businessmen Clifford & Ernest Corey, wonders of Southampton Contractors, believed that Nackawic was a good location for a pulp and paper mill, they attracted Parsons & Whittemore Inc. owned by the Landegger family

of New York as potential investors.

Today St. Anne-Nackawic Pulp Company Ltd. is one of two leading mills in North America producing high quality bleached hardwood pulp. Now between sixty and seventy per cent of the mill's production is directed at the specialty pulp market, this includes photographic, writing, computer, and tissue paper.

Photographers, both amateur and professional will appreciate that the Kodak paper good looks starts in Nackawic, New Brunswick. The mill has just received its fourth consecutive Kodak Gold Quality First award.

Under the same ownership Valley Forest Products Ltd. supplies the pulpwood and chips from provincially licensed crown lands as well as from surrounding private lands and local marketing boards. Southampton Sawmill was established in 1975 to make use of the valuable softwood saw-logs harvested at the same time as the hardwood pulpwood.

In 1979, St. Anne Chemical Co. Ltd. started production, the salt fields associated with Potash Mining provided the raw material to manufacture caustic soda, sodium chlorate, and chlorine, all used in the pulp mill. It reduced the necessity to transport these dangerous chemicals to Nackawic.

The Landegger family, with current Parsons & Whittemore Inc. President George Landegger, still maintains an active interest in the mill and the community. George Landegger participates actively in the many events which are held during the annual Family Day, a company sponsored picnic featuring everything from hotdogs to soft ball games and helicopter rides.

The forests have always played an important role in the history of the area and it is with great pride that St. Anne-Nackawic Pulp Co. Ltd. and its associated companies will work with the community of Nackawic when they face the challenge of being the National Forestry Capital of Canada for 1991.



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


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#### **Program Chairmen**

Klaus Gebert, General Manager, Cellpap Terminal Hamburg, Germany, and Marius A.J. Hoogewerff, Consultant, Global Logistics, VP, International Forest Products Transport Association (IFPTA), USA



Klaus Gebert, born in 1939, obtained his captain's license in 1965. He first came in contact with forest products during 1965-1968, being at sea on a special forest products service between Scandinavia and Hamburg. From 1968 to 1976, he worked in Hamburg in a forwarding, trucking and shipping company which also specialized in paper handling.

In 1976 he joined Cellpap Terminal Hamburg as General Manager. Cellpap's handling capacity amounts today to approximately 1 million tons/yr in Hamburg. Furthermore, company-owned trucking and stevedoring companies have been established. In 1988 Cellpap expanded its activities. In order to meet the future requirements of the Baltic traffic, Cellpap Terminal Kiel GmbH was founded.

Mr. Gebert is also one of the founding directors of the IFPTA and a member of the Hafenrat in the port of Hamburg.



Marlus Hoogewerff was born in Semarang, Indonesia, and is a Dutch citizen. He graduated from high school at Bloemendaal in the Netherlands, and attended the Dutch School of Foreign Business. After college, he worked for KLM Royal Dutch Airlines, working for both freight and passenger concerns. He then worked 21 years for Royal Netherlands Steamship Co. His command of seven languages proved to be a valuable asset as his work took him to a num-

ber of countries. He worked in every sector of the steamship industry. Mr. Hoogewerff came to the company's office in New York City in 1964 where he became Assistant General Manager in charge of ship operations and line managment for the entire Western Hemisphere. Mr. Hoogewerff joined Boise Cascade Corporation in 1974.

Some of his accomplishments and activities include: establishing main traffic patterns for Boise Cascade's principal marine movements of paper and wood products; managing marine transportation damage and loss prevention; developing a computerized export data system, which generates all shipping and export documentation in a fully automatic mode and which greatly improves productivity as well as improves accuracy in the paperwork itself; and coordinating BCC neo-bulk cargomovement requirements with a number of steamship companies and multi-purpose terminals in various ports of the world. This is cargo that is not suitable for the modern unit

shipping modes.

In 1989 he resigned from Boise Cascade Corporation and started his career as a private consultant.

Mr. Hoogewerff is a founding Director and Vice President of the International Forest Products Transport Association (IFPTA); he served as Director of the Agriculture Ocean Transportation Coalition and is an active member of the Society of Maritime Arbitrators of San Francisco; he also served as a member of the Boise Chamber International Trade Committee. He has been called upon by both Houses of US Congress to assist in modernizing the US Shipping Act and to contribute to other marine legislation. He is the author of several articles on marine transportation matters and has given guest lectures on this subject at several institutions of advanced education.


Mr. Hoogewerff's knowledge of transportation and his experience have earned him the respect and esteem of his peers in the international transportation fraternity.


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#### Keynote Speaker

Mr. Zimmerman is married with four children.

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

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
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#### Replacement cost of open-hatch type ships

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## The forest products freight market: History and future prognosis

Ulf Eriksen, President, Peraco Chartering (USA) Inc., USA



Ulf Eriksen started in shipping in Norway in 1967. He joined Peraco in New York in 1969 as Operations Manager. In 1970, he became involved in transportation of forest products from US Gulf and East Canada to Europe. In 1971, he switched to chartering and has since then worked exclusively on forestry transportation services worldwide. He became Director of Peraco in 1977 and President in 1982.

#### **Abstract**

Entering the 1990s, we stand at a new threshold for forest products transportation. The bulk of forest products is still transported in open hatch

ships, 30 years after the conception of the basic design. The market is divided into short sea trade and far sea trade, both of which have different requirements. Yet the fleet is aging in both cases with few newbuildings on order. Newbuilding prices are at a historic high.


Will the future freight market generate sufficient revenue to renew the fleet?

Will the designs of ships remain essentially similar?

Will the forest products transportation needs continue to grow at the present rate?

Are there alternative cross trades benefitting forest products transportation?

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# The availability, present and future of forest products carriers: Supply, demand, freight rate prognosis

George A. Adams, Vice President, Transportation, MacMillan Bloedel Ltd., Canada



George A. Adams was born in Grimsby, England, and enjoyed a sea-going career from 1954 to 1965 when he joined Furness Withy & Co in London. From 1970 onwards, he has worked for MacMillan Bloedel and its subsidiary companies.

He is currently President of Canadian Transport Co. Ltd, as well as Vice President Transportation for MacMillan Bloedel.

He is a Master Mariner, a Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Transport and a Freeman of the City of London. He added Canadian nationality to British in 1986.

His positions outside the company include: Director and Chairman of the British Columbia Maritime Employers' Association: Director and Vice Chairman of the Shipowners' Mutual Strike Insurance Association (Bermuda) Ltd; Director of the Vancouver Maritime Arbitration Association; Director of Empire International Stevedores Ltd; Member of the Pacific Pilotage Association; Liveryman of the Worshipful Company of Shipwrights; Director and Honorary Treasurer of the Missions to Seamen; a Past President of the Chamber of Shipping of British Columbia, and Vice President, Member of Council of the Chartered Institute of Transport.

### **Abstract**

The presentation, given from the perspective of a West Coast Canadian shipper, will trace the historical structure of bulk shipping patterns and their impact on the availability and costing of ships for the forest products trades. It will consider the subsequent evolution of trading patterns which led to today's situation where vessels are still readily available but unable to sustain earnings. levels which will justify replacement of aging tonnage.

The presentation will consider the future availability of tonnage to meet the changing requirements of the forest industry.

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Peter Merin, Research and Development Manager, Auramo Cargo Systems Oy, Finland, and Mark Henderson, Vice President, US Operations, Auramo Inc., USA



Peter Merin obtained his M.Sc. in Mechanical Engineering at the Technical University of Helsinki in 1984. After graduation, he joined Valmet Offshore as project co-ordinator and was engaged in various multi-discipline offshore oil and gas projects.

He became involved with pulp and paper handling in 1987 after joining Auramo Cargo Systems, the manufacturer of Auramo truck attachments, where he was appointed Research & Development Manager.

Within the company Peter Merin has been responsible for introducing new technologies into the Auramo attachment design. He is the project manager for the Auramo mechatronics project which focuses on the design and development of the first intelligent paper roll clamp utilising modern microprocessor technology.

Peter Merin is also a member of the International Forest Products Transport Association (IFPTA).



Mark W. Henderson joined Auramo Inc. in 1990 as Vice President of US operations. Auramo Inc. is the US subsidiary of Auramo Cargo System Oy, Finland, one of the world's leading manufacturers of pulp- and paper-handling, list-truck attachments.

Mr. Henderson brought with him 10 years of marketing/management experience in the material-handling, transportation and paper industries. Mr. Henderson holds a Bachelor of Science degree from the Atlanta Christian College, East Point, Georgia.

### FAO revises pulp forecast downwards

Brissels Total world paper and board (P&B) capacity will grow by 2.8%/yr between 1990 and 1995, according to the United Nations Foxel and Agriculture Organization (FAO). Total pulp capacity is expected to grow by 1.9% over the same period. The growth rate for P&B is similar to that predicted in the FAO's previous survey, but the rate for woodpulp is 28% lower. The study also predicts that the apparent ratio of pulp to paper will fall from 70.7% in 1990 to 67.5% in 1995.

At 36.3 million tons, newsprint capacity still represents 14% of total P&B capacity. It is expected to grow by around 5.3 million tons by 1995. Once again, the biggest growth in capacity is forecast for the developing market economies, with an average rate of 6.2%/yr, compared to 3.6% for 1985-90. The 2.8%/yr average growth rate for the developed economies since 1985 is expected to continue until 1995. But the study predicts a fall in newsprint production in the centrally planned economies of almost 1%/yr until 1995, with a 7%/yr decline in Eastern Europe and no

growth in the USSR.


The loss forecast for printing/writing papers is not as dramatic as it is for newsprint, although Eastern Europe is still expected to see its capacity fall by nearly 3%/yr until 1995. The study predicts that growth in printing/writing output by the developed market economies will fall from 5.5%/yr in 1985-90 to 4.3%/yr in 1990-95, while for the developing market economies, it will rise from 5.3% in 1985-90 to 5.5% in 1990-95.

Total woodpulp capacity is expected to rise from 168.5 million tons in 1990 to 185 million tons in 1995. This increase is 28% lower than

in the previous survey. And mechanical pulp production will continue to decrease, by an estimated 160,000 tons by 1995. The FAO has revised its capacity forecast downward for thermomechanical pulp (TMP) and chemical pulp too. TMP capacity is expected to grow by 4.5 million tons by 1995, with Western Europe accounting for an estimated 1.9 million tons of this increase, North America for 1.8 million tons and the developing countries for 0.7 million tons. The projected increase of 12.3 million tons of chemical pulp by 1995 will raise capacity to 127 million tons. A slight increase is forecast for other fiber pulp.


Klaus Burhop was born in Bremen, Germany, where he completed his formal education, including a degree in business.

Scott S. Menzies, President, Baltimore Forest Products Terminal (BALTERM), USA



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

During the past 12 months, his company has been working towards BS5750 accreditation.



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### Shipping legislation in the USA and Canada and its impact on world trade

William A. McCurdy, Jr., Logistics & Commerce Counsel, E.I. du Pont de Nemours & Co., Inc., USA



Bill McCurdy graduated from the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Economics and Finance in 1968 with a B.S. in Economics and received his J.D. in 1971 from the University of Pennsylvania Law School. Following graduation, he entered the US Navy where he served in various legal capacities including that of Military Judge for the Caribbean Circuit.

Upon release from the military and following a short time with a prominent New York admiralty firm, he joined the Legal Department of E. I. du Pont de Nemours & Co. where he has been employed for the past 15 years. In his current position as Logistics and Commerce Counsel, Bill advises the company on logistics, supply chain, customs and countertrade matters.

As Logistics and Commerce Counsel, Bill led the industry effort that resulted in the passage of the Hazardous Materials

Transportation Uniform Safety Act of 1990. This was the most significant change to the law since the original act was passed in 1974. In addition, he has been extremely active in shepherding the transition within du Pont from a common carriage transportation system to one dominated by contracts. This has resulted in significant savings and has established du Pont as a leader with "benchmark status" in transportation procurement. His role in industry was recognized by his recent election to West's "Who's Who in US Executives".

He is currently serving as an officer, committee chairman and board member of several national trade associations including The National Industrial Transportation League, the AgOTC.

#### **Abstract**

United States Secretary of Transportation Samuel K. Skinner recently stated: "An investment in transportation is an investment in America's future. No industry in the nation is more important to US economic growth and international competitiveness than transportation, Every household and every business, our mines and manufacturers farms. utilities, export trade and national security, all depend on transportation."

The same could be said for virtually every nation in the global marketplace. Logistics has or will become the watchword for innovative companies as

they seek "sustainable competitive advantage" in world trade. The supply chain management process, integrated logistics, and other "logistics systems" will require new attitudes, new cultures and, in some cases, enlightened, new interpretations or modification of transportation related law.

Shipping legislation in the USA, Canada and Europe is currently under active review. Elaine Chao, Deputy Secretary of Transportation and Vice Chairman of the US Advisory Commission on Conference in Ocean Shipping, recently observed: "I continually see signs that we have launched the commission's activities and investigation at an ideal time -- in fact, at an historical moment when the global trading system is on the verge of fundamental change and expansion.\*

The integration of these new logistics principles, emerging transportation and trade legislation, and resulting economic and cultural change will fashion the global environment in which we will all compete for the balance of this decade and in the years to come.

Machiavelli is reported to have said: "There is nothing more difficult to carry out, nor more doubtful of success, nor more difficult to handle, than to initiate a new order of things." Surely his observations were never more true than today. Whether we survive or whether we perish will depend largely on how well we, as individuals, companies and countries, adapt to the coming changes.

### Lübeck Port – West Germany's largest Baltic forest products terminal


Lübeck Port is a pace-maker as Europe's most important ferry port and the largest West German port on the Baltic: Performance in handling forest products underlines this leading position.

Annually the port handles 1.7 million tons of forest products using the most modern technical equipment. The port has available four roll-on/


roll-off piers and 120.000 square metres of covered warehouse space.

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### The "war on waste": How can our industry win?

Vincent A. Benvenuti, President, Quebec & Ontario Recycling Ltd., Canada



Vincent A. Benvenuti has been employed with Quebec and Ontario Paper Co. for the past 15 years. He has held positions in finance, marketing and administration. He is currently Director of Planning and Administration for the Thorold division mill, and has had responsibility for all of Q&O's recycling programs since 1982. He is a member of numerous recycling trade associations, including the Recycling Advisory Council for the Province of Ontario, which advises the Minister of the Environment on recycling issues. He chairs the Wastepaper Task Group for that body. He is also an active member of the Recycling Council of Ontario, the Canadian Pulp & Paper Association's Re-

cycling section, the Canadian Association of Recycling Industries and the National Solid Waste Management Association.

Mr. Benvenuti was also appointed president of Q&O's new recycling subsidiary - Quebec and Ontario Recycling Ltd. in October of 1989. This company has two recycling plants in Toronto. One of the principal activities is processing and sale of all recyclables collected in the metropolitan Toronto Blue Box program, the largest curbside collection program in North America.

Mr. Benvenuti graduated in Business from McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario. He also holds a professional accounting designation.

#### **Abstract**

Back in 1960, social critic Vance Packard wrote in his classic work, The Waste Age: "Historians may allude to this as the Throw-away Age". Here we are, three decades later and his description of the second half of the 20th Century still holds true for residents of industrial nations. Mounting piles of garbage are a feature of vitually all industrial market na-


Garbage has become a key focus of the environmental movement all through the industrialized world. This focus has captured the interest of the public (and therefore, all our politicians) and legislation to regulate and reduce waste is now a part of the agenda of all governments worldwide. The three R's - Reduce, Re-use and Recycle - have become the means to wage war on waste.

What will this war mean for the global economy and specifically what will it mean for us in the forest products industry? It is obviously having a profound impact in the North American marketplace. The need to find markets for wastepaper generated through the explosion in municipal recycling programs has forced the North American newsprint industry to transform itself, almost overnight, from cutters of wood to collectors of wastepaper. To do this, billions of dollars of new investment will be required, all at a time when the newsprint industry is in the middle of the worst slump it has ever experienced.

The public demand to reduce waste and recycle more is: going to intensify in the years ahead. It will present many challenges and many opportunities for all our companies. None of us can afford to sit on the sidelines and hope that this movement will pass us by. We all need to be involved or we

won't survive.

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### Concentration within the European pulp and paper industry

The recent round of consolidation during the past two years has increased the degree of concentration in Europe's paper industry. It is, however, still less concentrated that the North American industry.

sion is over.

The pace of major acquisitions appears to have slowed somewhat as companies are much more circumspect about high debt loads when markets are slow and margins are thin.



# East Germany's paper industry two years after reunification: Present situation and future development

Michael Herrmann, Branch Manager, Fr. Meyer's Sohn, Germany



Michael Herrmann, born in 1944, was educated and trained at Messrs. Deutsche Seereederei Rostock (DSR). Afterwards he studied at the University for Traffic, Dresden, with special study of traffics and industrial management.

Later, he worked in different organizations of foreign trade and in the official state forwarding agency Deutrans in the former German Democratic Republic, now the eastern part of a united Germany.

Since July 1990, Michael Herrmann, has been employed by Messrs. Fr. Meyer's Sohn Hamburg, an international forwarding enterprise, at its branch office in Berlin.

Just now, he is engaged in the establishment of new offices in the new five federal countries of Germany at Berlin-Schönefeld (air cargo) and at Rostock (sea transport).

### **Abstract**

The East German paper industry did not belong to the main important branches of the national economy of the former GDR and was faced with a great difference in the level of productivity in comparison with the West. This is the reason, why big problems arose after introduction of the Deutsch Mark on the 1 July, 1990. With introduction of the Deutsch Mark on the territory of East Germany, the paper and pulp industry was suddenly faced with world market conditions without being prepared for these conditions in any proper In addition to this, the former GDR's foreign trade and transport was monopolized by the state. Therefore the producer factories had no possibilities to make export, import and transport arrangements on their own. Nowadays, the producers have to perform these activities themselves, and they are faced with difficulties in this field too.

Notwithstanding these difficulties, the paper industry in eastern Germany has a long tradition. The consumption of paper products in the east is very much lower than in the west part of Germany. That is the basis for a significant increase in production in the future

The report gives a short historical picture, indicates the present situation and makes an attempt to give a future picture for the paper and pulp industry in East Germany including the possibilities and facilities for transportation of paper, pulp and forest products. A short review of the paper and pulp industry in the former socialist countries of eastern and southeastern Europe is included.



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### The development of the Rhine-Main-Danube Canal

L.A.G. (Bert) Rensen, Managing Director, Interrijn BV/Rebes BV, Netherlands



L.A.G. (Bert) Rensen, born 1939, was initally employed by several shipping and forwarding companies both in the Netherlands and abroad.

In 1971, Bert Rensen founded Interrijn B.V. in Rotter-dam primarily for the transportation of freight on the European inland waterways. Interrijn now operates a large fleet of Rhine barges, carrying approximately

four million tons per annum of which 300,000 tons are forest products.

To expand his activities internationally, he founded B.V. Rebes with a view to establishing a total door-to-door package service. Rebes activities cover: chartering, ship's agencies and distribution of several (neo-) bulk products to and from Western Europe. Rebes, in close cooperation with Roba of Switzerland, controls a large share of the distribution of forest products and kaolin from Dutch and Belgium ports through to Western and Middle Europe.

The group is also very active in the transportation of rolling stock, including private cars, tractors, trucks etc. along the Rhine for which they utilise specially constructed Ro-Ro barges.

Bert Rensen, together with his partner J.I.M. (Joep) Slokkers who is primarily responsible for Rhine traffic, expects further rapid expansion of these companies; especially bearing in mind the future link of the Rhine with the Danube which is of special interest to both Interrijn and Rebes.







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### Transport of newsprint and kraft reels: The final leg

# Outlook for international trade in solid wood products: Factors influencing US competitiveness in the 1990s

Stephen M. Lovett, International Vice President, National Forest Products Association (NFPA), USA

#### **Abstract**

Clearly the major threat to our industry today comes from protectionist pressure which increasingly constrains resources. This problem is aggravated by public perceptions of our export trade portfolio, which is weighted towards raw materials and primary products, especially to markets in the Pacific Rim.

Nevertheless, these export markets offer the biggest potential for gains in value added products to keep the US industry vigorous, healthy, and competitive. The problem is a complicated one, caused by an interlocking net of foreign tariff and non-tariff barriers to further processed value added products. These impede sales of these products in the overseas marketplace. It is very unlikely that attempts to resolve this problem through protectionism, restraints on trade, or other simplistic approaches will yield good results.

To make these markets part of the solution, rather than part of the problem, the US government and industry must continue to coordinate with Canadian counterparts on an export strategy that balances the trade portfolio by increasing market penetration for further processed wood products. This paper will discuss these issues, and summarize the enormous export potential for US value added wood products, especially if current efforts to eliminate overseas trade barriers are successful.

Steve Lovett is Vice President for international trade at the National Forest Products Association (NFPA) in Washington, D.C. He administers the solid wood industry's government funded export promotion programs, and represents the industry in the formation of US trade policy and trade legislation.

Before joining NFPA in 1986, he was affiliated with DBC Associates, Inc., a firm specializing in market access and consulting to the People's Republic of China. He conducted an extensive study of China's market for wood products, one of the most comprehensive studies to date of an



industrial sector's market potential in China. He speaks fluent Chinese, and has more than eight years' experience working in the Far East.

Mr. Lovett is a native of Connecticut and a graduate of Harvard University. He holds a Master of Arts from Stanford.

NFPA's International Trade Council assists both the soft-wood and hardwood industries in exploring off-shore trade opportunities, and works closely with government agencies to lower trade barriers to US wood products.

### A receiver's point of view: Cargo care in woodpulp transportation

Winand H.F. Bruninx, Manager Logistics Raw Materials, Feldmühle Langerbrugge NV, Belgium



Winand H.F. Bruninx was born in 1934 in Antwerp, Belgium. He made his main studies in the French-speaking part of Belgium. Since 1958, he has been active in various Antwerp forwarding companies, and in shipping departments of the commercial trade as well, such as the Natural - Crowe - Lep group, Solvay (chemicals) and Bunge (grain trade) where he was Head of the Malt Department. His experience covers many different aspects of shipping and transport.

In 1976, he joined the Brussels Raw Material Department of the former Papeteries de Belgique, and was transferred in 1981 to the paper mill in Langerbrugge, Ghent, where he is now responsible for raw materials logistics.

### **Abstract**

Cargo care concerns primarily handling, but we wish to extend the meaning towards information, documents and communication as well.

Moving woodpulp from starting point to place of arrival (from machine to machine) is one continous movement, a nearly endless string of many details which is called: transport. It includes telephone calls, information on sailings, loading, discharge, storage, documentation, custom-clearance, respecting contracts and Incoterms, and so on.

When all details are done perfectly, one should receive perfectly conditioned units. But let's be realistic. This is not Utopia. We are human beings and, it appears, nobody is perfect. The least one can expect is that all concerned people should try to reach as near as possible to that perfection.

Here will probably be raised the question: Why?

Because one should realise: this is not "just woodpulp"...

For the producing mill it is a finished product with a high degree of quality and value, to be used in an industry requesting also a high degree of quality: the quality of magazine paper (and other papers as well) which starts with the quality and condition of woodpulp.

In this speech I will try to give information about our own experiences to many concerned people, going back to the origin why something happened somewhere.

In the whole transport string, the receiver is rarely a consulted party. On the other hand there are probably several reasons why receivers do not take initiatives in the transport happening.

In the past years, we have succeeded in building up close contacts with some shipowners, agents, stevedores.

We are confident that within time, more and more people will be better informed about "why" and "how", and will consequently take more of their own responsibilities.

# Marine insurance, damage prevention and liability issues for cargo, ships, ports and stevedoring companies

#### **Abstract**

Despite its centuries-old origins, marine insurance has shown a remarkable ability to adapt to the changing needs of international commerce. While still founded on good faith, it continues to develop and probably contains far less conflict than other forms of insurance. The speech covers aspects of the current marine insurance business, centering on the

Value Policy and taking the socalled Particular Average Adjustment as an example of the equity of insurance protection.

#### HISTORY

The earliest settlers were amaded at the vast areas of forest land and the diversity of hardwood and softwood species in New Brunswick.

Significant areas of land were cleared for cultivation. Farmers also utilized the forests for the construction of homes and barns. Other settlers established sawmills and produced forest products for export.



The availability of high quality timber led to the development of a world famous shipbuilding industry. Many vessels were used to transport forest products to Britain, returning with immigrants to settle in New Brunswick.

For almost two hundred years New Brunswick has been supplying the European market with lumber. The forest is a rich natural resource that continues to contribute to the economic development of this province. The future of this primary resource and its potential for utilization is ensured through the application of responsible forest management practices by industry, private woodlot owners and government.

### FOREST MANAGEMENT

The New Brunswick forest contains a wide range of superior quality softwood species including white, black and red spruce, balsam fir, jack pine, eastern white pine, eastern hemlock and eastern white cedar. New Eranswick hardwood species include red and sugar maple, yellow and white birch, beech, oak, basswood and aspen.

Our forests differ from those of most European countries. Natural regeneration is an important aspect of forest management in New Brunswick. Forest workers take care to protect the new growth, during harvesting, ensuring the original mix of softwood and hardwood species is maintained.

Reforestation is an important form of silviculture in New Brunswick. Provincial nurseries produce 30 million quality seedlings each year. *Industry, private woodlot owners and government plant more than 60 million seedlings annually*. New Brunswick plants more trees (on a productive hectare basis) than any other Canadian province. One new tree is planted for every tree harvested on Crown land.

Fest control and fire protection are major forestry activities of the Government of New Brunswick. The spruce budworm is the primary pest that threatens the forest. Each year the forest is assessed and protection programs enacted to preserve fir and spruce species. Every year wildfires cause considerable damage to our forests. Aerial detection, water bombing programs and ground fire fighting are all part of the fire protection activities.

New Brunswick is a Canadian leader in developing guidelines and adopting regulations to manage the forest in a responsible way.

Our goal is to produce a forest that offers sustainable production, protection for wildlife and its habitats and recreational opportunities for people.

#### **ENVIRONMENT AND LIVING IN HARMONY**

We have always lived close to the land. The forest has provided employment and recreation for generations of New Brunswickers. It is important to maintain and enhance the forest. Corporate stewardship, government programs and volunteer activities improve the quality of water and air, prevent soil erosion and provide interpretive educational sites.

New Brunswick has more anglers and hunters, per capita, than any other province in Canada. A growing number of people are involved in other outdoor recreational activities.






Forest management strategies are designed to have a positive impact on these wildlife related activities.


### FOREST INVENTORY


New Brunswick's total area consists of 7.3 million hectares. 6.3 million hectares or 86% consists of forest land, some 6.1 million of which is productive forest land.




### In forest crop per hectares, New Brunswick is second only to Sweden.

The productive forest land consists of 51% public and 49% private land with some 35,000 woodlot owners.






The volume in stocked, productive non-reserved forest land consists of some 5.71 million cubic meters. Of this amount 64% is softwood and 36% hardwood (1986).



#### ANNUAL HARVEST

The annual harvest of New Brunswick forest consist of some 8.7 million cubic meters of which 52% is from public land and 48% from private land (1986).





### INDUSTRY PROFILE

New Brunswick's forestry industry consists of some 377 establishments made up of 134 primary mills, 231 secondary plants and 12 pulp and paper mills (1990).

The forestry sector provides approximately 21.588 jobs in New Brunswick of which 12.153 are in manufacturing and 9,400 in forest harvesting. This amounts to 655 of the total labour force or one in every twelve jobs in New Brunswick (1990).

In direct jobs alone it is estimated that the forestry industry accounts for \$458 million in wages and salaries (1988).

Some 41 communities in New Brunswick are dependent on the forestry.

#### SHIPMENTS AND TRADE


The total value of shipments of New Brunswick forest products is \$2.7 billion. Forest related industries account for 40% of the manufacturing sector and approximately 8% of the provincial gross domestic product (1988).

New Brunswick's share of the national export of forest products is 7%. New Brunswick's share of the national output is woodchips (3%), woodpulp (10%), newsprint (4%) and other paper and paperboard (12%) (1989).

Major forestry products exported include wood pulp (47%), other paper and paperboard (21%) and newsprint (22%).

Major export markets include United States (60%), the European Economic Community (26%) and Japan (8%).

#### **EXPORTS BY PRODUCT GROUP**








